Prospects are landing on our page(s) and when they arrive, they can now click on a new feature listed as the "Marketplace". This addition allows potential customers to see the various products that are completed and in stock through our Dealer network. Now, as we head into the 3rd quarter, there will be significant attention given to the ag products. Harvester parts sales will be on the increase and we will be preparing for several important ag shows that will highlight our spreaders. So, it sure seems that things are going to stay busy with lots on the "to do" list. Seriously, maybe we really should start praying for longer days and longer weeks. After all, if the Lord can multiply a few loaves and fish to feed the multitudes, he can certainly add a few minutes to our days to help us get "it" all done.

Exciting Times

Exciting and diverse times are happening as we enter the 3rd quarter of the year. We're having our best year ever for dump body orders since we started in 2015, already exceeding our combined total from all three years prior. We have a wide variety of trailers we're currently working on. They range from portable toilet trailers, to small custom tank trailers, to large semi-trailers. Chassis mounted vacuum tanks aren't taking the back seat either as we're working on many aluminum, steel and stainless steel units. Some of these tanks are equipped with hoists and full open doors. Aside from the whole goods orders we work on, our service department is also busy and often requires engineering assistance. The schedule is full and we embrace a busy second half of the year.
