

Production has been busy on all fronts. Spreaders, Tanks, Dump Bodies, and parts orders for Harvesters. Harvester parts order typically slow down soon, as their season is wrapping up. A thanks to everyone that has helped out in all these rush orders coming through production, and their need to ship ASAP. Your ability to turn this work quickly, keeps customers up and running, and is much appreciated. In production over the past months, we've averaged building three tanks per week, and 1-1/2 to 2 dump bodies per week. We have seen a shift in this work in the past few weeks

though. With tanks averaging two per week, and dump bodies increasing to three per week. Along with this, we are also building some new aluminum dump bodies. Welding has adapted their area and you can really see that when you walk through the department. Well done! With this shift, we see a lot of cross-training happening as well. It's not always easy, but Production's ability to shift, give a helping hand, train someone that hasn't worked on the line, learning a new product, or working in a different area of the plant, is one of its strengths. So thank you, and keep of up the good work!


